Museum News

Looking Closely at 2012.211

Going through some old exhibition files, I came across an A2 size poster of a photograph in the Kawerau Museum collection. It shows dozens of houses being built in Robinson, Grey and Normanby Streets. Some have walls and roofs, just waiting for a front door and glass windows, while others are wooden frames that sketch out the shape of the house to come, no roof tiles or weatherboards yet. Left-over lumber is scattered all over the place.

There are no people and no vehicles anywhere, which adds to the already uncanny feeling of a whole suburb sprouting up in an undeveloped landscape. There is a weird greenish tinge to the poster, like the scene is underwater, and its large size, obviously blown up from a small original photo, pushes to the very limits of legibility. The image is starting to break up and turn fuzzy. Blue ink marks are scattered across the sky, the kind you get when wet ink is accidentally transferred by your fingers. The image is mysterious, maybe even a bit creepy: Kawerau after the rapture has taken all the good people to heaven, or a zombie apocalypse.





Curious to see the original, I retrieved item 2012.211 from the museum storage. It's a very small photographic print, with a handwritten note on the back, in blue ink, saying it was taken from the roof of Tasman House in 1953. The photo forms a pair with 2012.210. They don't precisely line up, but with some overlapping they create a panorama. These photos are part of a series, showing more streets and houses, and the men who are building them, a neat insight into a specific moment in Kawerau history. Buildings take shape on various streets, ready for families to turn them into homes.

Of course, the real 2021.211, the original photo, is not actually weird or borderline creepy, just an interesting historical record, the kind of image you can imagine illustrating a history of Kawerau, or maybe an article about postwar house building in New Zealand. Everything that initially caught my eye is a result of the decisions that the printers made when a scan of a small photographic print was enlarged into a poster for an exhibition. But I like that my first impression from the poster still lingers when I look at the original photo, as if there is something strange going on, just out of view, in what seems to be a straightforward view of houses being built in Kawerau.




