COMMUNITY PĀNUI UPDATE



20 FEBRUARY 2025



In the coming weeks, Council will be talking to our community about our water service delivery.

As part of the Government's "Local Water Done Well" reforms all Councils must assess the financial sustainability of their water service delivery (i.e. drinking water, storm water and waste water). As part of the assessment of financial sustainability, Councils must also consider forming partnerships with neighbouring Councils where it is appropriate.

Last year, along with the other Bay of Plenty Councils, Kawerau has been assessing the financial viability of a multi-Council model for water service delivery. This assessment does not commit Kawerau District Council in any way, but the model helps form a useful comparison for the community with our current inhouse delivery of water services.

The new legislation enables Council to:

- Continue delivering water services in-house OR
- Join with other councils to form a multi-Council owned organisation OR
- Establish new water organisations that can be owned by councils and/or consumer trusts

At the 26 February Council meeting, a report will outline the options available to Kawerau District Council, the costs and the benefits, opportunities, and any drawbacks. Elected members can choose what they believe are the best options for community consultation. We will then hold a series of meetings

and make information available for our community to have your say about the way water services are delivered to the district.

This process will run in parallel with the Long Term Plan consultation and will include a series of public meetings, and people will be asked to provide formal feedback through the submission process.



Changes to how you receive your newsletter

on state highway speed limit changes

Some speed limits lowered over the past few years may soon revert to their previous higher speed limits. NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi has began consulting on some of these changes to see if people who use the roads and the local communities, support the current speed limits in some locations, or wish to see them revert to the previous higher limits.

Sections of state highway currently 80km/h that are open for feedback about keeping the lower limit or reverting to 100km/h include:

- SH30 Te Ngae Junction to Lake Rotoiti
- SH30 Lake Rotoehu to Lake Rotomā
- SH30 Lake Rotomā to Te Teko
- SH30 Te Teko to Awakeri
- SH30 Awakeri to Whakatāne

Consultation on community support for lower speeds in this area is open until 13 March 2025.

Conserve Water



Council is still encouraging the community to reduce water usage.

In January the district's water usage averaged at 2,594 cubic metres per day. This is above the usage expected for a district of our size, although still within consented limits. With the hot weather likely to continue for a few months yet, it is important to get on top of our water usage now.

In Kawerau, based on the 2,594,000L/day, every person is using 331 litres, per day. Our goal is to reduce the daily water usage to 200-250 litres per person. This will help us be better stewards of the resource, will help us stay within our resource consent limits, and will ensure there is water in the reservoirs for emergencies, such as forest fires.

Since December the Tarawera Bores have been unable to provide an adequate water supply to meet the community's demand. Māori Investment Limited generously allowed the district to use water from Umukaraka Springs under an approved emergency resource consent. Council wishes to thank Māori Investment Ltd once again for allowing us to use the water on such short notice.

Please be mindful of our kaitiakitanga and responsibility to look after and protect the water for ourselves and future generations.

Please note: the water usage figures do not include commercial and industrial users of water. Industry generally has resource consents to take water directly from the Tarawera River. Commercial businesses which source water from Council, are metered and charged for their usage.

Recycling Update

You may have noticed a few changes to our recycling collection process. Our team is now sorting recyclables at the kerbside (rather than later on). This helps increase efficiency, as it is much easier and quicker to sort one bin at a time rather than sorting all the bins after they are collected and taken to the Transfer Station. Only the recyclable items will be picked up from your recycling crate. Thank you to the community for your patience, as we moved into the new system of sorting at the kerbside.

What Can I Recycle?

In Kawerau, you can recycle plastics numbered 1, 2, and 5, cans, tins, glass jars and bottles, paper, and cardboard. Remember, you can still sort your recycling separately by squashing down and neatly bundling paper and cardboard. Glass bottles and jars can be placed in the crate in the box they originally came in.

Please ensure that all items are rinsed, and food scraps and lids are removed before recycling.

What if items are left in the recycling crate?

Our recycling team will only collect what can be recycled. If something is left, you will probably also receive a note to advise what can be recycled. The aim is to improve recycling practices in our district and provide a more efficient and effective way to collect and sort recyclables.

PREPARE, SET, READY

In an emergency, the water supply may be cut off, or water and sewerage lines may be damaged, and you may need to use improvised emergency toilets. To make an emergency toilet, use sturdy, watertight containers that can hold approximately 15-20 litres. For example, a rubbish bin or an empty paint bucket. Your container should have a snug-fitting cover.

Line buckets with plastic bags if possible and pour or sprinkle a small amount of regular household disinfectant (such as chlorine bleach) into the container each time the toilet is used. This will reduce odour and germs. If you don't have disinfectant, you can use dirt and dry materials. Be sure to replace the lid after each use, and thoroughly wash your hands using soap and water, or use hand sanitiser after using the toilet. When your toilet reaches capacity, dispose of the waste following public health advice.

Easter Trading Policy consultation open

Submissions for the Draft Easter Sunday Shop Trading Policy are now open!

The purpose of the policy is to allow shops in the Kawerau district to open on Easter Sunday. Kawerau District Council has previously had an Easter Sunday Shop Trading Policy in place, that has been revoked. This consultation asks the community and local businesses if they would like to reinstate the policy.

Council is aware that over the Easter weekend, more people are entering the district, to visit, shop and stay. Currently, Council does not have a policy, that allows shops to open on Easter Sunday. This means, only businesses that comply with section 4, of the Shop Trading Hours Act 1990, can open on Easter Sunday. This is a disadvantage for other local businesses, who may wish to trade on the public holiday.

Please note, if this policy is adopted, it will give shop owners the choice of whether they want to open or not. Employees are not obliged to work, as it is a public holiday, it is up to the employee's discretion.

Dog Control

Our dog rangers have been putting in the hard mahi | work recently. Over December and January, the dog rangers have responded to 137 service requests. 102 of these service requests were related to roaming, barking and attacks.

During the past two months, there have been a few issues involving attacks on people and animals. Handled on a case-by-case basis, these issues have resulted in some dogs being impounded or surrendered, warnings being issued to owners and property inspections being completed.

In the same period, 22 dogs were impounded. Four of the dogs were returned to their owner and 14 dogs /puppies were rehomed or placed with the SPCA.
