Mahere ā Tau Proposed Annual Plan 2023-2024 <mark>Adopted</mark>

The Mahere ā Tau | Annual Plan 2024-25 was adopted by Council on Wednesday 26 June 2024 for 2024/25 year, the Annual Plan will come into effect 1 July 2024 until 30 June 2025.

Key areas were:

Average rates increase of 12.2%

The 12.2% average rates increase includes a \$50 increase of the Uniform Annual General Charge (UAGC) of \$900 per property. Council considered various options for the amount of the UAGC, one was to leave UAGC unchanged. However, this meant that the higher valued properties got the largest rate increases because all additional rates required for 2024/25 were charged as a portion of each property's capital value. By increasing the UAGC to \$900.00, meant the increase in rates was spread more evenly over both higher and lower valued properties.

Following feedback from the community during the submission process, Council made the following decisions which helped to lower the rates increase:

- Lowering the levels of depreciation funding back to 65% *Rates reduction - \$114,500 (0.8%)*
- 2 Not proceeding with additional staffing positions and maintaining a small number of vacancies *Rates reduction \$213,000 (1.6%)*
- 3 Reviewing financing options and timing of loan drawdowns for water reticulation renewals *Rates reduction \$45,000 (0.3%)*
- A Not proceeding with the asbestos site (albeit mainly funded from depreciation this does have a small positive financing impact) Rates reduction - \$3000 (0.08%)

These measures reduce the overall rates increase to 12.2% for 2024-2025.

Maurie Kjar Aquatic Centre

Thank you, everyone, for your patience and understanding while the steam bore that supplies the Maurie Kjar Aquatic Centre with heating was repaired.

The well drillers diagnosed the issue and found a build-up of silica and limescale, causing the steam bore to stop working.

The drilling supervisor explained the steps they took when trying to prevent the build-up in the future; the base of the bore at 79 metres is soft clay, and the well drillers plugged the last two metres or so and then sleeved the bore to prevent silica build-up.

The pools are back to their usual temperatures, and the Maurie Kjar Aquatic Centre kaimahi | staff look forward to seeing everyone swimming again.



The adoption of the Annual Plan for 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025 means Council adopts the new fees and charges for that period. Most of Council's fees and charges have risen by the rate of inflation (around 4.7%). The new fees and charges are available on the Council website.

Reviews showed that ratepayers were subsidising the use of some services and facilities and these fees and charges were increased as follows:

Private hire of the Maurie Kjar Aquatic Centre

Fees to privately hire the Maurie Kjar Aquatic Centre and/or the barbeque have been increased to assist with cost recovery of this valuable facility. The cost to privately hire the Maurie Kjar Aquatic Centre has increased from \$30 to \$50 per hour.

The cost to hire the barbeques is increasing: The small (portable) barbeque is increasing from \$6 to \$10 for two hours. The large barbeque (fixed) is increasing from \$12 to \$20 for two hours.

Replacement Bins

The cost of all replacement bins (including recycling crates) is increasing from \$12 to \$18. While the actual cost of a new bin is substantially higher (\$71.35 for an 80/120L bin) Council will gradually increase this charge overtime to recover costs.

Firmin Lodge Fees

The hireage fees for Firmin Lodge Adventure Hub have also risen by more than the rate of inflation. This is due to short-term hireage not covering the cleaning and booking costs. Council has set minimum hireage fees to ensure that all users of Firmin Lodge cover the full costs of hireage. The casual occupancy rate now starts at \$325.

In raising these fees, Council noted that there are other facilities in the district are available for shortterm hire at lower costs including Bert Hamilton Hall, Concert Chamber, Town Hall and the Rangi Delamere Centre.

Kawerau Kaumātua and seniors enjoy Matariki Lunch with the Mayor

More than 120 kaumātua and seniors attended the Matariki Mayoral lunch. The kaumātua and kuia shared kai | food, stories, and laughs. Mayor Faylene Tunui gave an address, answered questions from the floor and hosted a quiz about Kawerau. After the quiz, Mayor Faylene sang a song that brought back some memories for all the attendees- the Kawerau Central School waiata.

During lunch, there were lovely waiatas from Howie Morrison Jr. and Takerei Hikuroa-Peck. They performed several songs, such as' Where Have All the Flowers Gone?' and 'If I Could Change.'

Between songs, Howie spoke about his time working in Kawerau, reminiscing about how family-oriented the town was. "Everything has changed," Howie said, "but Kawerau will always be a family-oriented town." Thank you to everyone who attended and our fantastic performers who made the lunch even more special.

Community Tree Planting Ceremony

Council's first Matariki event held on Monday, June 24 was a tree planting ceremony to pay tribute to loved ones who have passed.

Council's Cultural Advisor and Ngāti Tūwharetoa ki Kawerau kaumātua Te Haukakawa Te Rire started the ceremony with a karakia | prayer and a waiata | song. Then, Mayor Faylene Tunui spoke about what Matariki represents and gave recognition to tangata whenua and acknowledged those who were present at the start of the 2023 Māori New Year but are no longer with us.

Kawakawa leaves were handed out to everyone to lay at the feet of the Pōhutukawa tree in memory of loved ones who have passed. The tree will grow with the kawakawa leaves beside it and can be used as a memorial for those who have passed away. Kawakawa is an important plant in Māori culture, used for both its medicinal purposes and as a sign of mourning.

Council's Cultural Advisor Te Haukakawa Te Rire finished the ceremony by blessing the Pōhutukawa tree as it was planted. The event finished with refreshments in the Concert Chamber.
