Susurrous

Definition - full of whispering sounds

Susurrous comes from the Latin susurrus, meaning "a hum" or "a whisper." It may describe any one of a number of whispering sounds and isn't restricted to that of leaves moved by wind. However, in autumnal months it is a lovely word to think on as you come across this sound. The noun form ("a whispering sound") is <u>susurration</u>.and the night was filled with a slow, sad, susurrous rustle, like the wind fingering the pines, which was not, however, the sound of wind in the pines but the breath of thousands of sleeping men. — Robert Penn Warren, All the King's Men, 1946

tihitihi

(verb) to make a gentle rustling sound, rustle, whisper (of the wind, etc.). *Ka pai te rangi, ka hauhau, ka tihitihi te hau (W 1971:416).* / It's a nice day, breezy, and the wind is rustling.



Could you be the missing link to this story?

One of the things that the museum team really enjoys is a late-night search on Trade Me. We always hope to find Kawerau-related treasures that can become part of the museum collection.

Recently we came across two badges sporting the name of Kawerau. One, for the Kawerau Fish Society, is very stylish, with its flamboyantly finned fish and name in dark blue enamel against silver. The other, also blue enamel against a gold background, is for the Kawerau W.B.C., and announces that its original owner was a Life Member.




Trade Me is great for picking up unusual items, but one downside is that these objects tend to be cut off from their prior histories. The dealer who sold us these ones had a giant collection of badges from all around Aotearoa. There's no telling how many hands they passed through before ending up in his possession and listed for sale. He certainly wasn't a Life Member of the Kawerau W.B.C., or a member of the Kawerau Fish Society.

Who received these badges originally? When did they get them? Did they wear them with pride? And even more basic than that, what exactly is the Kawerau W.B.C. or the Kawerau Fish Society? They must have been local organisations. Does W.B.C. stand for something like Women's Basketball Club?

The museum team is going to spend the next month finding some answers to these and other questions.
